FOREWORD

The Westchester County Department of Health (WCDH) plays a leading role in promoting health, preventing disease, and prolonging meaningful life for Westchester County residents. WCDH monitors and controls the spread of communicable diseases, monitors and regulates air and water quality, enforces the state and local sanitary code, promotes local public health activities, and assures the availability of community health services.

To comply with New York State Public Health Law, WCDH has collaborated with local hospitals and other community health partners to complete a *Community Health Assessment (CHA)*, which describes the current health status of Westchester County residents, identifies existing gaps and health care barriers, assesses the availability and accessibility of health care services, and specifies public health priorities in the County. In addition, a *Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP)* has been crafted to lay out the specific objectives, goals, and actions of the Health Department to address the public health priorities identified in the Community Health Assessment. Such efforts are documented in this volume: *Westchester County Community Health Assessment (CHA) and Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP), 2014-2017*.

The first section of this document briefly describes the general demographic and socioeconomic characteristics of Westchester County population, followed by the assessment of current health status and existing gaps as measured by the New York State Department of Health's Preventive Agenda indicators. The collaborative process of identifying public health priorities and WCDH's improvement plan to address such priorities are included in the second section of this document.

The third section presents the regional profiles for each of the county's 25 towns. The profiles present information on geographic locations, demographic and socioeconomic characteristics, open spaces and housing, vital statistics, emergency room visits, hospitalizations, chronic diseases such as cancer, communicable diseases, public school student obesity status, and public

health relevant resources. A detailed map of sources is presented for each town. The last section of this document lists relevant resources and references.

WESTCHESTER COUNTY

“Westchester has it all”. Indeed, with an area of about 450 square miles, Westchester County is one of the most beautiful places in the country, home to nearly one million people according to the 2010 Census. The County is just north of New York. It is bordered on the west by the Hudson River, on the north by Putnam County, and on the east by the Long Island Sound and Connecticut’s Fairfield County. Within its border, there are breathtaking rolling hills, parks, farmland, lakes, reservoirs, running rivers, as well as modern cities and advanced roads.

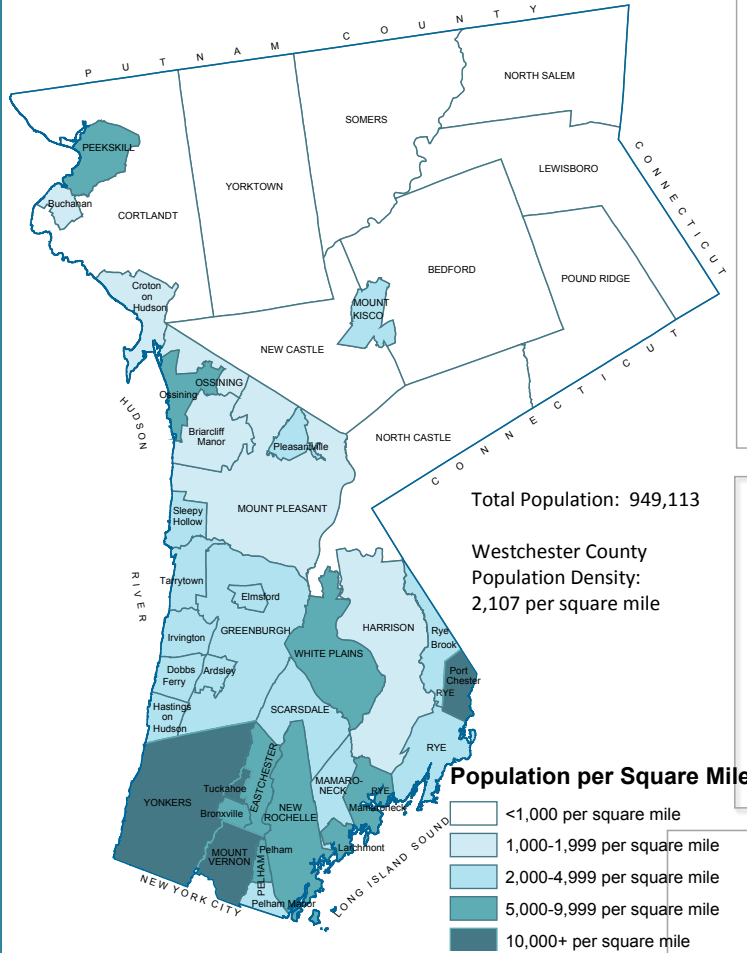
In addition to its gorgeous natural scenery, Westchester County is rich in its historical and cultural heritage. It has been home and still home to many famous figures in the country. Many significant historical sites and estates are within walking distance. Twelve colleges have their main campuses and headquarters in the County. The very first and only government-planned amusement park in the country, Playland, still has its pre-1930 roller coaster, the Dragon Coaster, rolling and rolling.

Currently, the County contains six cities and 19 towns (many include incorporated villages within the town borders). Like its kaleidoscopic geographic and natural features, the County’s population is also diversified and ever-changing, with an increasing number of various minority groups and foreign-born population, further enriching the County’s history and culture.

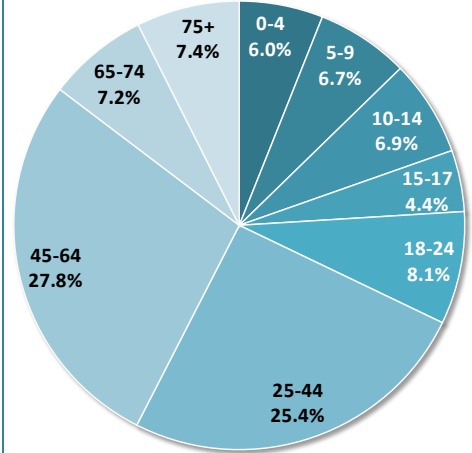

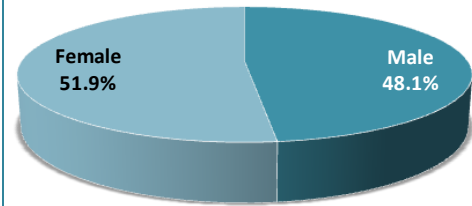
Population Density by Municipality, 2010



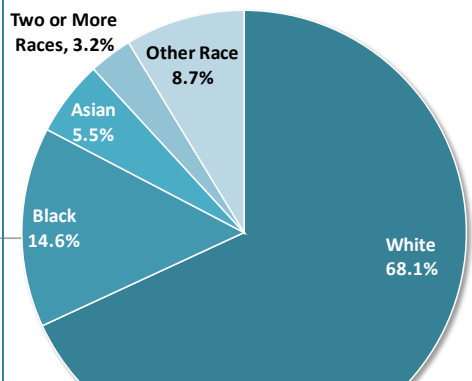
Age Distribution, 2010



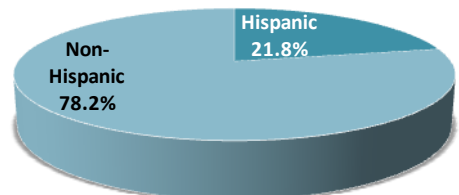
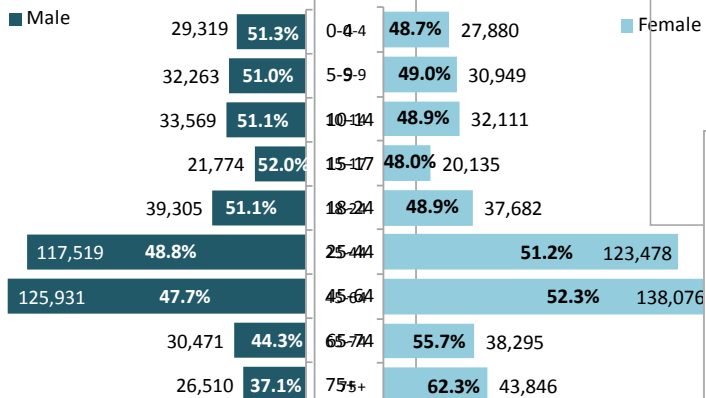
Sex Distribution, 2010



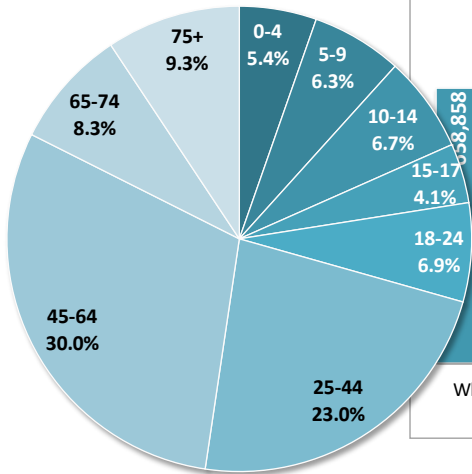
Race & Ethnicity, 2010



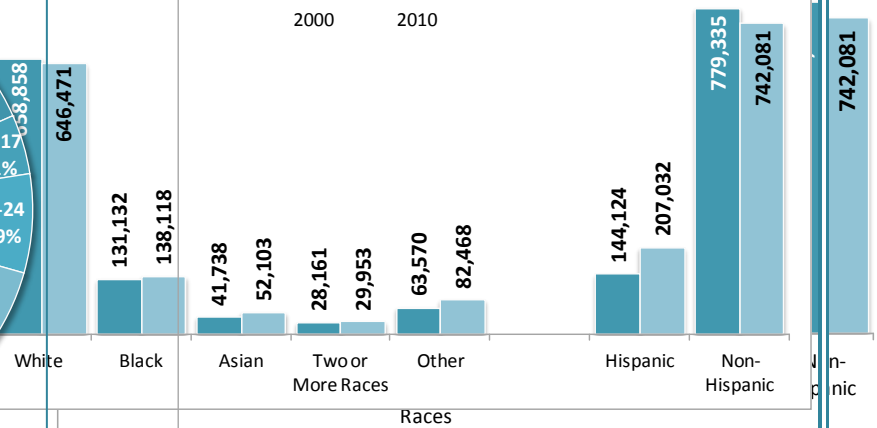
Population Distribution by Age and Sex, 2010



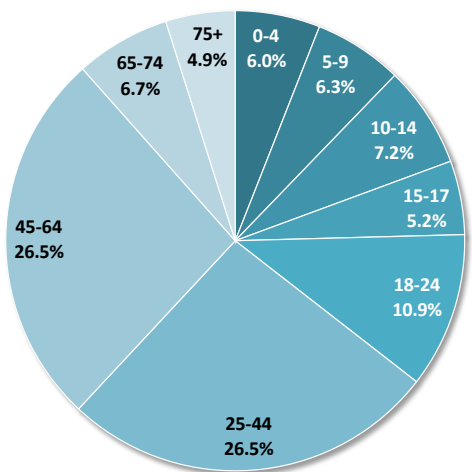
Age Distribution, Whites, 2010



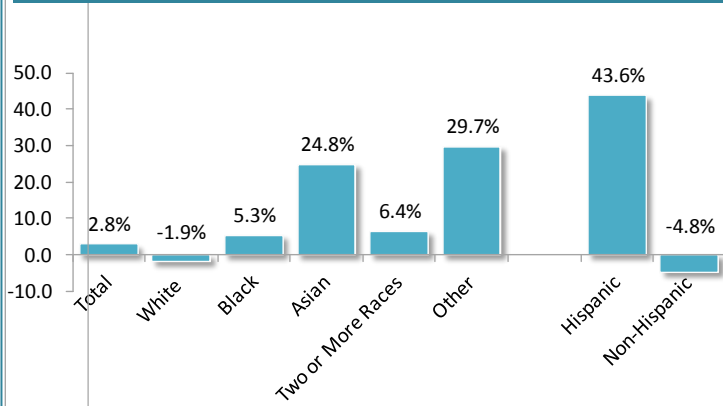
Change in Population by Race & Ethnicity, 2000-2010



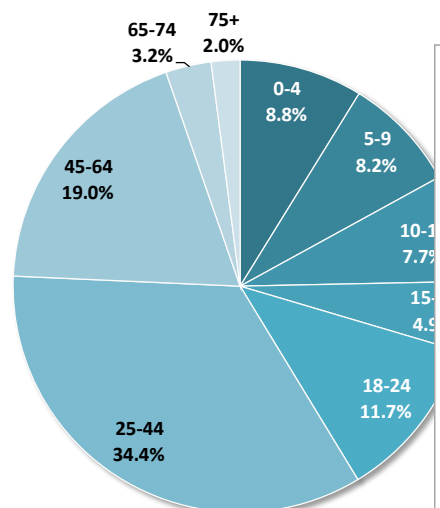
Age Distribution, Blacks, 2010



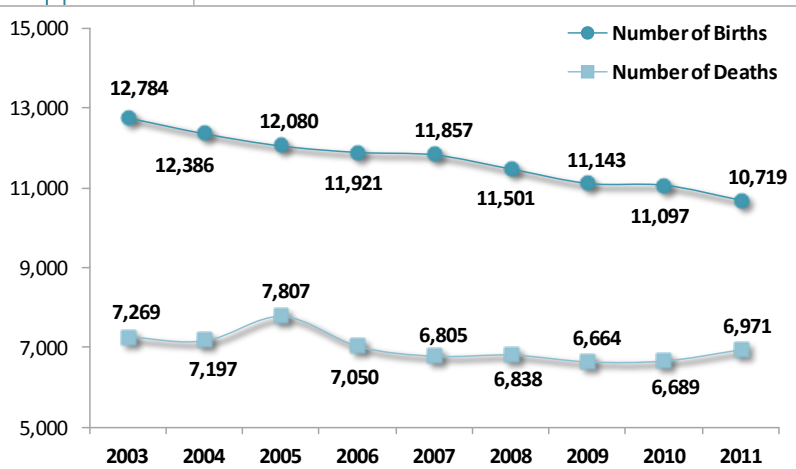
Percent Change in Population by Race & Ethnicity, 2000 to 2010



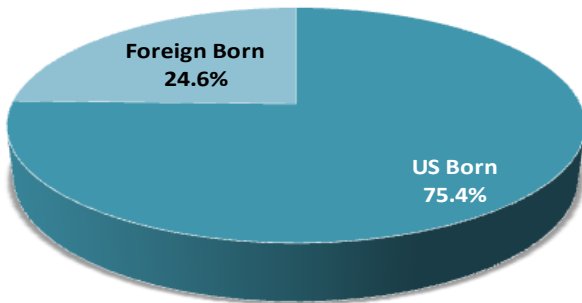
Age Distribution, Hispanics, 2010



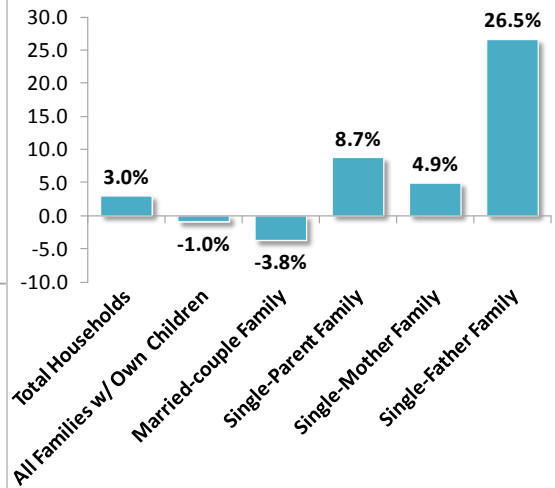
Total Number of Births & Deaths, 2003-2011



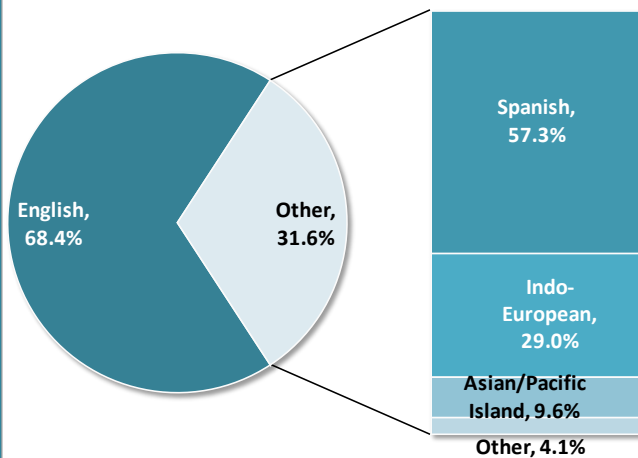
Population Distribution by Place of Birth, 2010



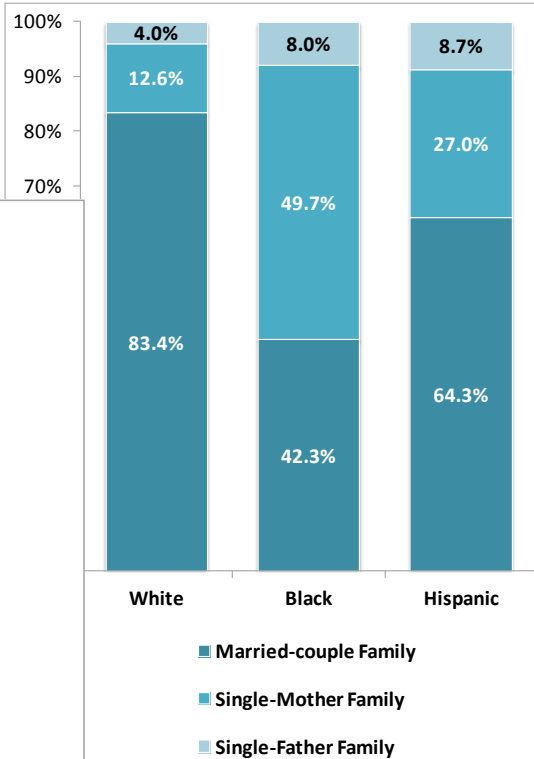
Percent Change in Family Structure, 2000 to 2010



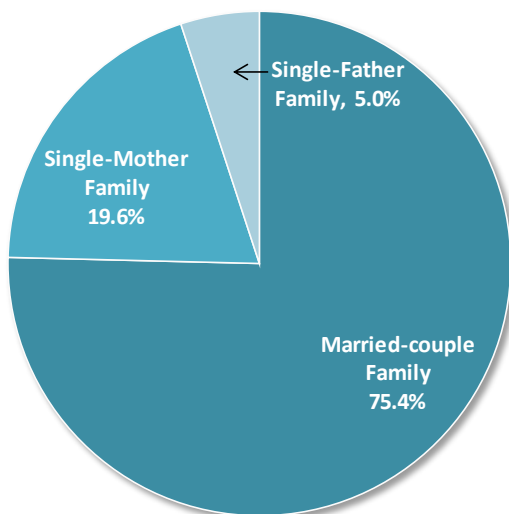
Population Distribution by Language Spoken at Home, 2010



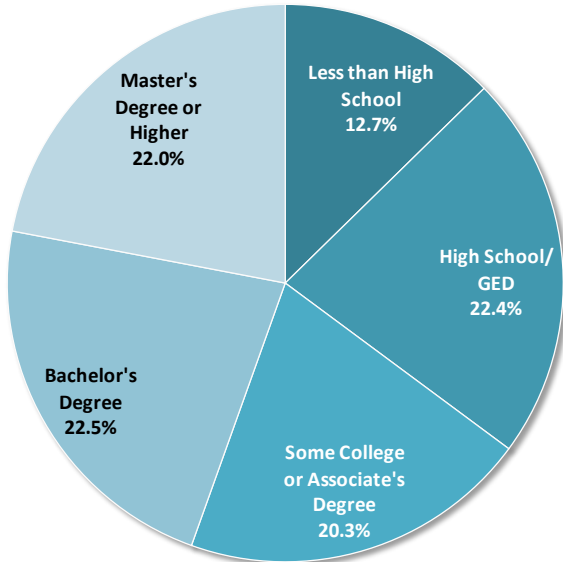
Family Structure Distribution By Race & Ethnicity, 2010



Family Structure among Households with Own Children Under 18 years of Age, 2010

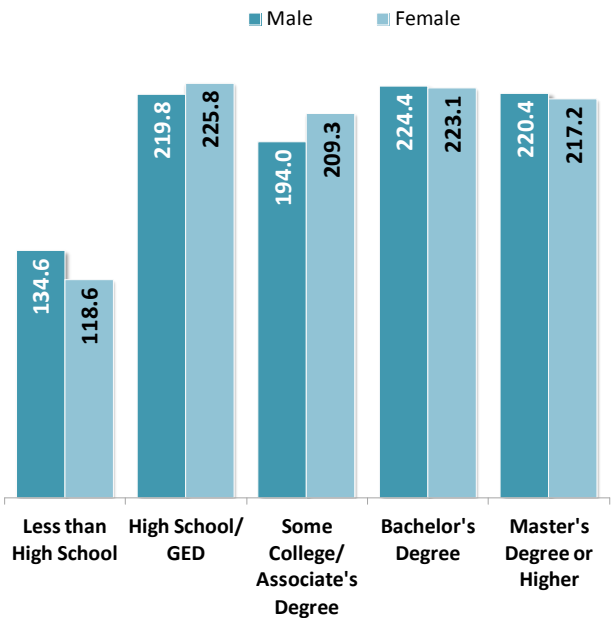


Educational Attainment among Adults Aged 25 Years and Older, 2007-2011



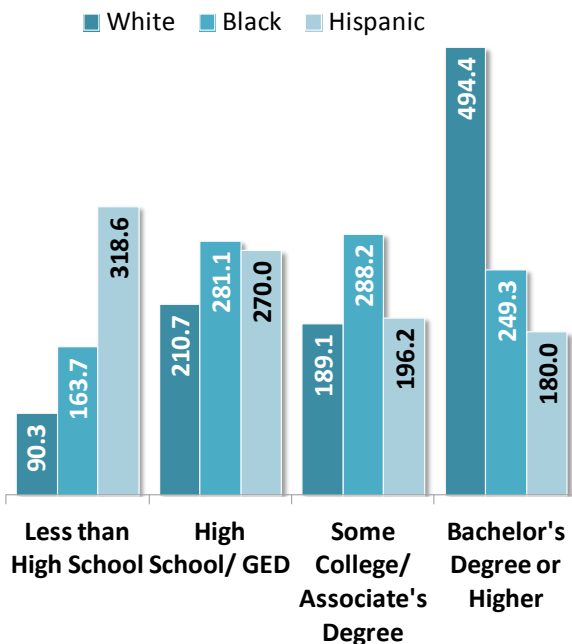
Rate of Educational Attainment among Adults Aged 25 Years and Older by Sex, 2007-2011

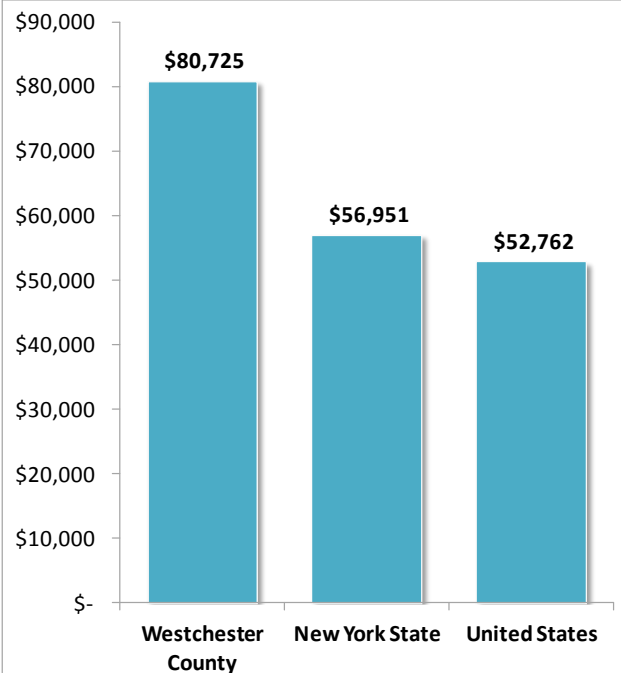


Rate of Educational Attainment among Adults Aged 25 Years and Older by Race & Ethnicity, 2007-2011

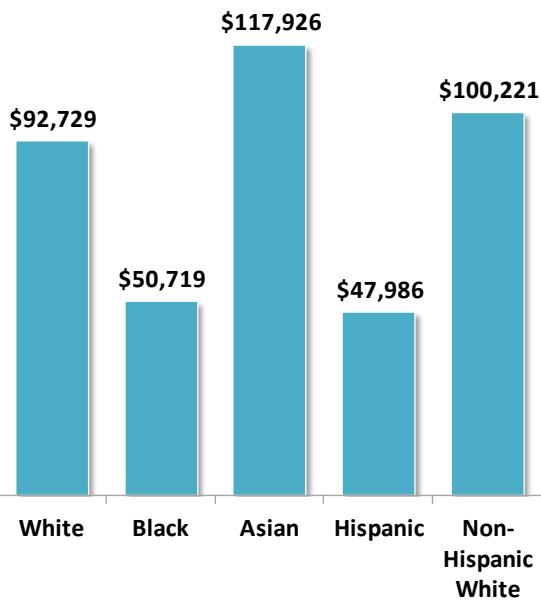

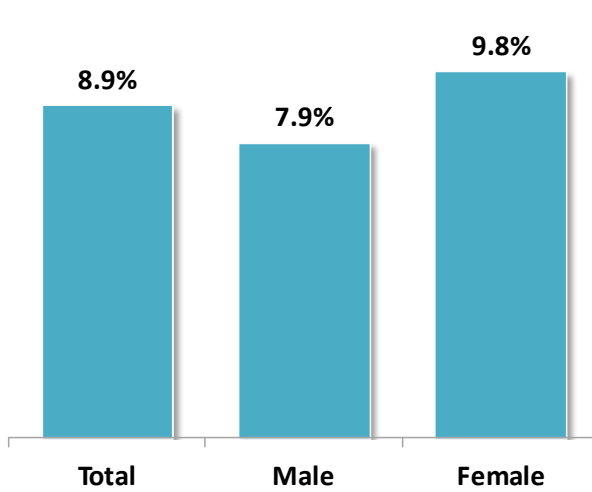
Median Household Income, Westchester County, New York State, & the United States, 2007-2011



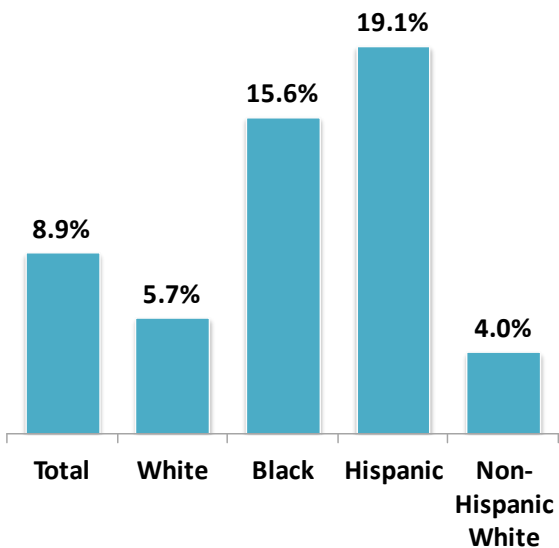
Median Household Income by Race & Ethnicity, 2007-2011



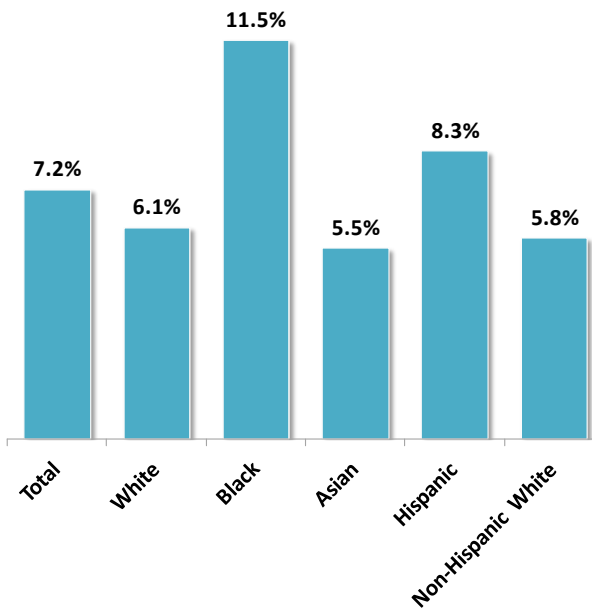
Percent of Population Living Below the Poverty Level by Sex, 2007-2011

Prevention Agenda Priority Areas and Health Indicators

In the effort to make New York the healthiest state, New York State Department of Health adopted the Prevention Agenda 2013-2017, a four-year plan, to identify New York's most urgent health concerns. Developed in collaboration with multiple organizations, the plan identified five public health priorities:

- Prevent Chronic Diseases
- Prevent HIV, STDs, and Vaccine Preventable Diseases, and Healthcare Associated Infections
- Promote Healthy Women, Infants and Children
- Promote Mental Health and Prevent Substance Abuse
- Promote a Healthy and Safe Environment

The Prevention Agenda calls for improving health status in all five priority areas and reducing health disparities for racial, ethnic, disability, socioeconomic and other groups who experience them. For each priority, the Prevention Agenda established specific goals and presented evidence based and best practice interventions for action that can be implemented by various sectors within the public health system to meet such goals. In addition, the Prevention Agenda provided measurable objectives that can be used to assess current status and monitor progresses in the future.



As part of the Community Health Assessment, WCDH Planning & Evaluation (WCDH P&E) conducted an extensive review and analysis of all the health indicators contained in the NYS Prevention Agenda and compared Westchester County indicators with the NYS 2017 objectives.

For each indicator presented in the NYS prevention Agenda, WCDH P&E reviewed whether the County is below, in range, or exceeding the state objective, the estimated number of people impacted when not meeting the goal, the County's overall ranking for the indicator compared to other New York counties, and the performance range of all the counties within the state.

The number of indicators that Westchester County has achieved the goals and the number of indicators the County needs improvement are summarized for each priority area.

The symbol presented in the column “WC Status compared to NYS Objective & Rank among NYS Counties” indicates Westchester County’s current status compared to the New York State 2017 objective. The blue triangle indicates a status better than the 2017 objective; the red, inverted triangle indicates a status worse than the New York State 2017 objective. The first number inside the symbol is Westchester County’s ranking among all New York State counties for which data are available, the second number inside the symbol is the number of counties with available data. For example, 13/45 means that Westchester County ranked 13th out of the 45 New York State counties with data.

Westchester County Health Planning Team: January – October 2013

On December 10, 2012, the Health Commissioner of New York State, Dr. Nirav Shah, sent letters addressed to all local health departments and hospitals asking them to work together with local community partners on assessing community health needs, identifying at least two local public health priorities, with at least one addressing a health disparity, and developing a community health improvement plan to address the identified priorities.

To help support and coordinate this collaboration, the Westchester County Department of Health (WCDH) invited all Westchester County acute care and specialty hospitals and the three Federally Qualified Health Centers to attend a kick-off meeting on January 31, 2013. The meeting was held at the Westchester County Department of Health (10 County Center Road in White Plains).

At the kick-off meeting Dr. Sherlita Amler, Westchester County Commissioner of Health, welcomed all participants. WCDH provided a brief overview of the prior planning process and the new requirements for both the health department and the hospitals specific to the development of community health assessments and community health improvement plans. The group agreed to form a Planning Team to work collaboratively on this project. During the past ten months, the group has demonstrated its commitment by attending monthly meetings, participating in two conference calls and hosting a Health Summit entitled “Working Together towards a Healthier Westchester.” In addition, the team has shared information, resources and updates through email and phone calls.

The team conducted an extensive review of all the health indicators contained in the Prevention Agenda with additional information provided by WCDH Planning & Evaluation (WCDH P&E). For each indicator, the team reviewed whether the County was below, meeting, or exceeding the state established targets/goals, the estimated number of people affected by each indicator (when available), the County’s overall ranking for the indicator compared to other New York counties, and the performance range within the State. The team often

requested the WCDH P&E to provide additional reports and analyses, including data at sub-county levels, to allow a more comprehensive understanding of the problem.

In addition to a thorough review of the data, the team considered if any of the proposed priority areas were attainable and if they aligned with each agency's mission and service area. With the diversity of the population within the County and the large number of hospitals serving different areas, it was quite challenging for the team to select the priorities that applied to all the agencies and the entire County. After careful considerations and discussions, the following two priorities were selected:

- I. Prevent Chronic Disease: Reduce Racial Disparities by Decreasing the Percentage of Blacks and Hispanics Dying Prematurely from Heart Related Diseases and,
- II. Promote Healthy Women, Infants and Children: Increase the Proportion of Infants that are Breastfed

The team developed an agency profile that was distributed to community partners. The profile requested each agency to provide general agency information, such as hours of operations, office locations and service areas, as well as to include current activities, training and policies in place to support the selected priorities and any new activities planned. The team also invited community partners to a half-day summit that was devoted to sharing current activities and programs and to discuss what could be done to address the selected health priorities.

As part of its ongoing commitment to addressing the identified health priorities, the team plans to continue meeting regularly to review the progress in implementing the improvement plans developed by each agency, to work together, when applicable, on planned activities, to discuss barriers to implementation and consider new strategies that can be adopted. The Team also plans to regularly convene the attendees from the health summit to provide input and support on project implementation.

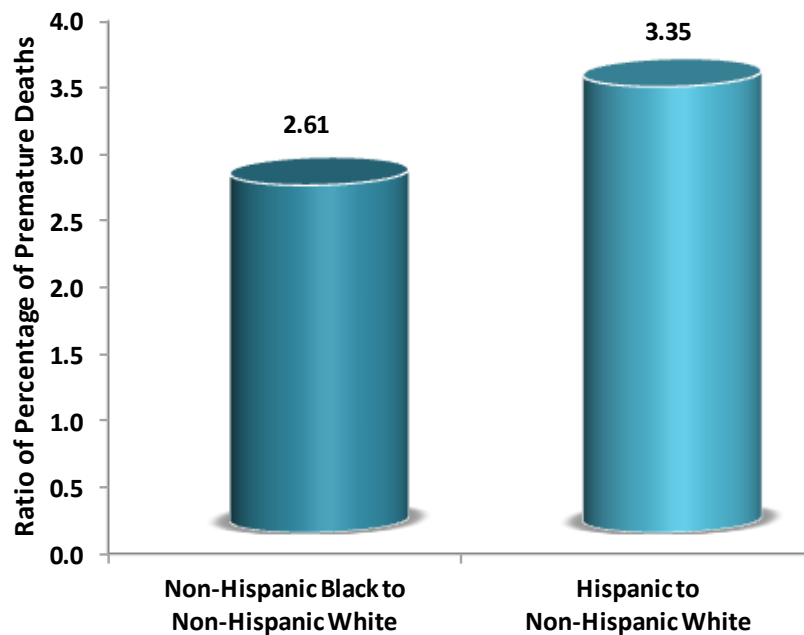

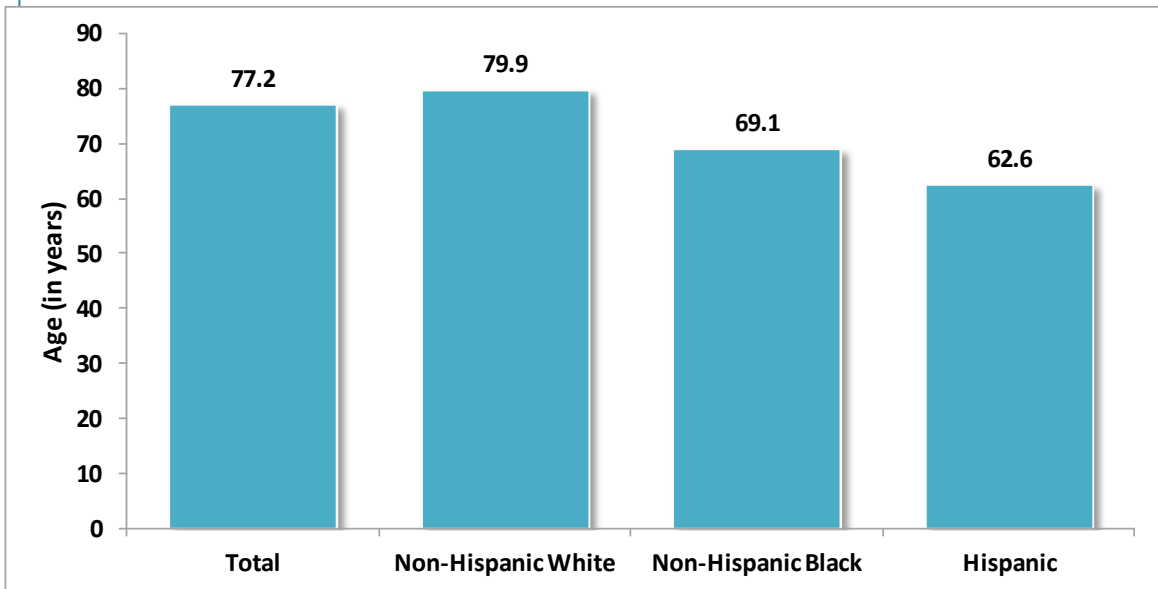

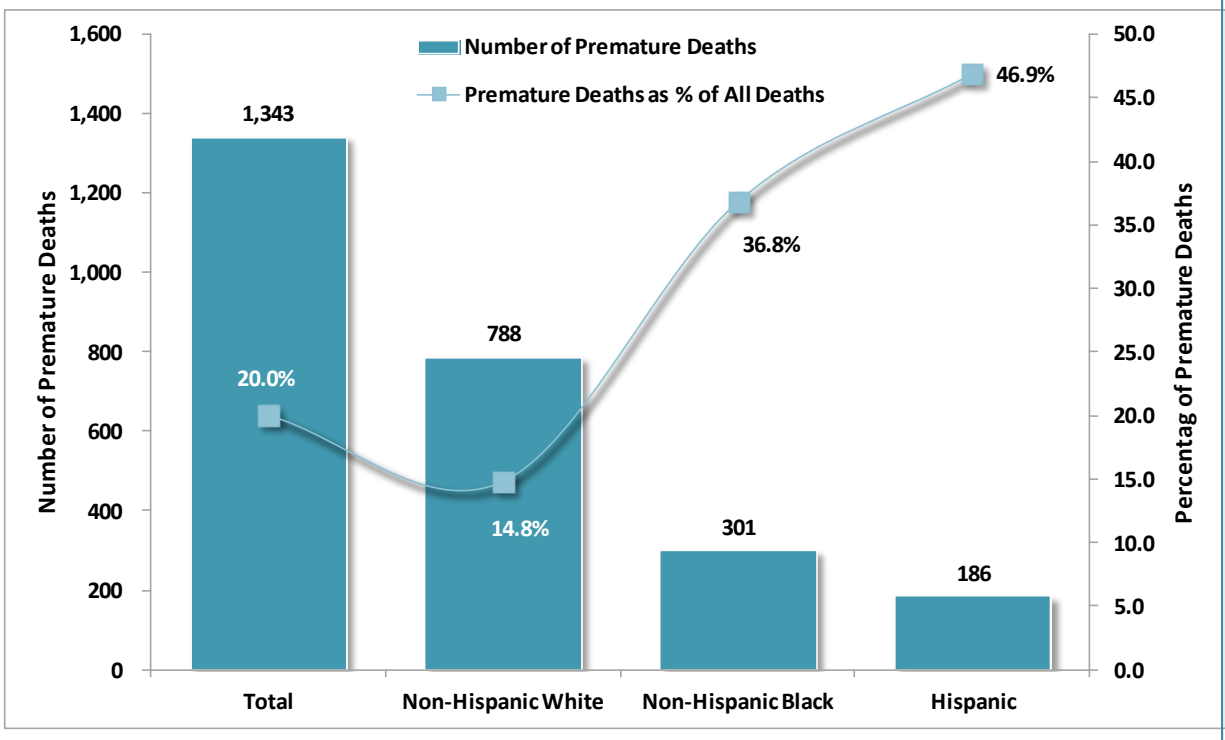
Ratio of the Percentage of Premature Deaths due to Diseases of the Heart by Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010



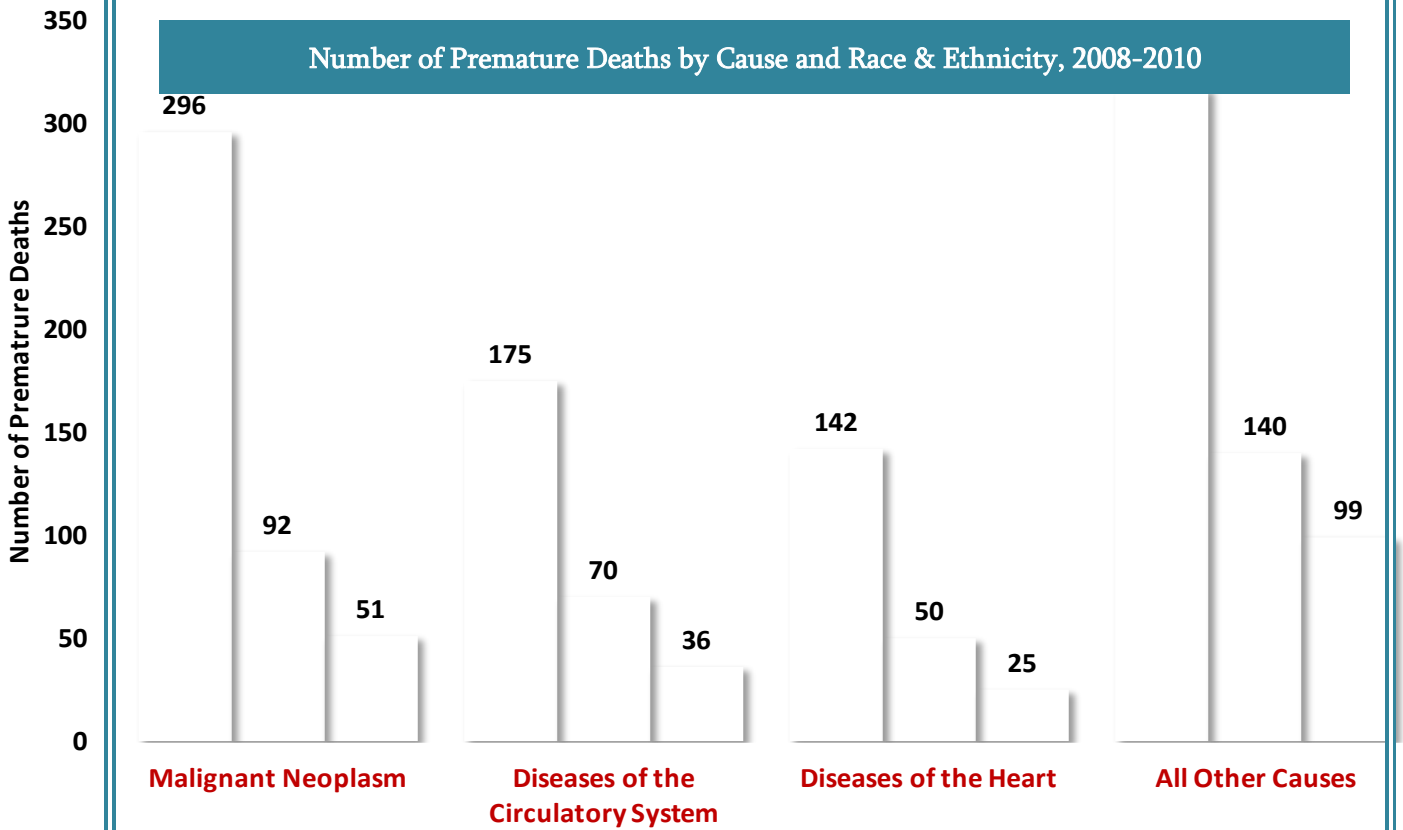
Average Age at Death by Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010



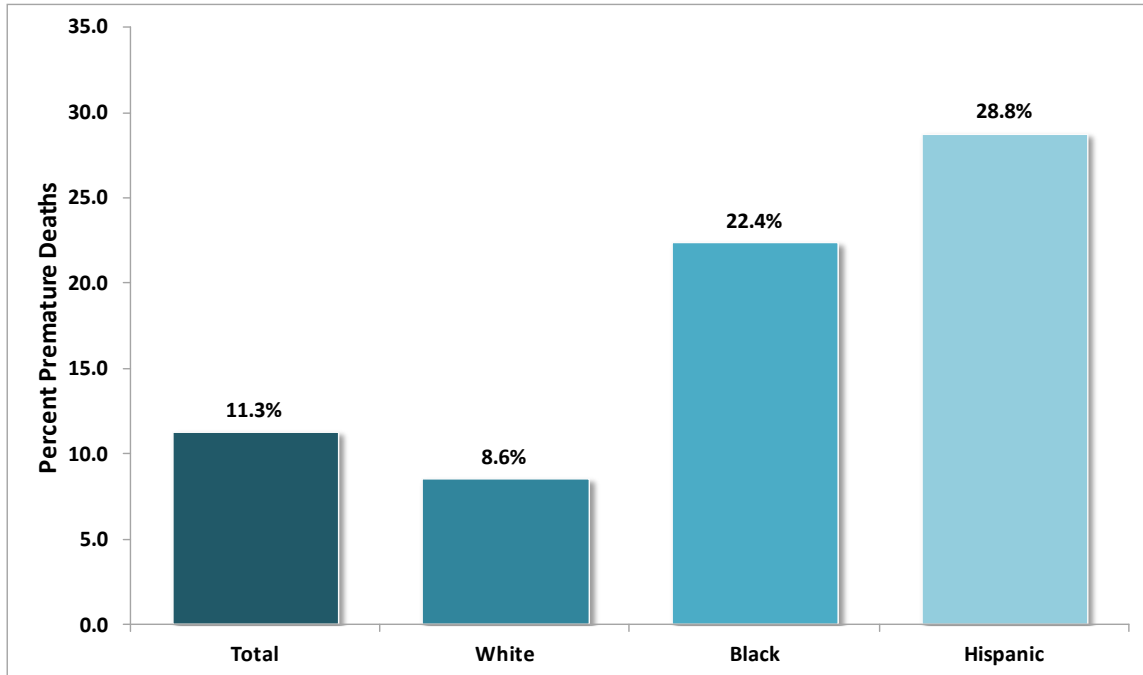
Number of Premature Deaths and Premature Deaths as a Percentage of All Deaths by Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010



Number of Premature Deaths by Cause and Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010



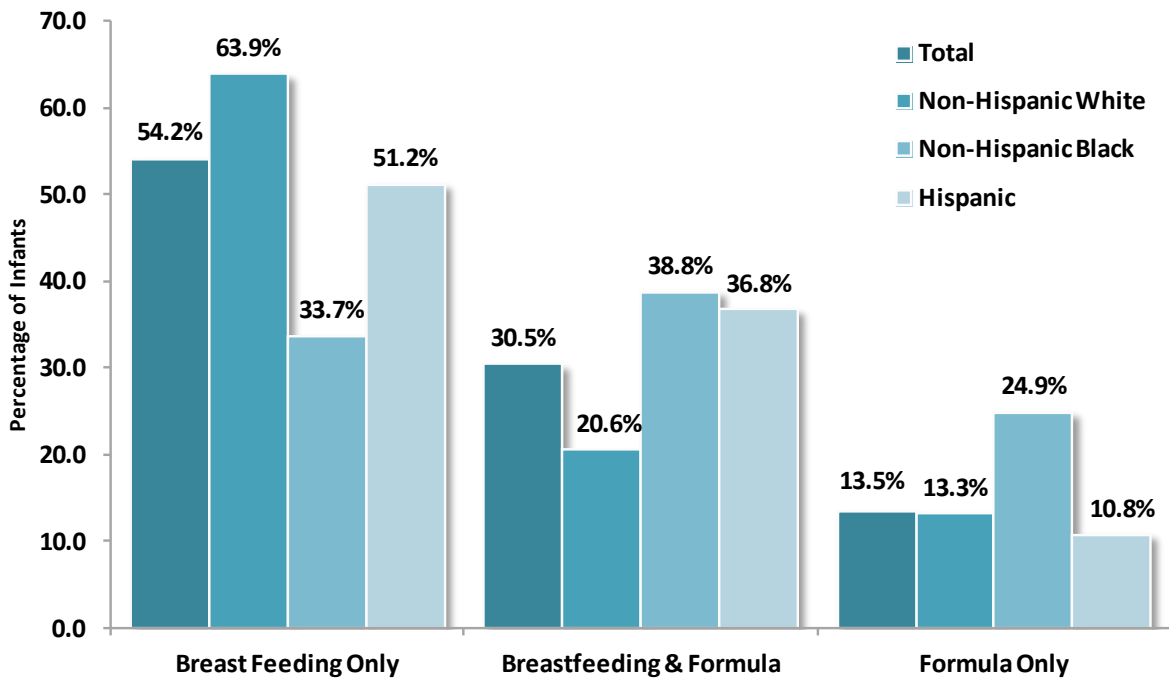
Premature Deaths as a Percentage of All Deaths due to Heart Disease by Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010

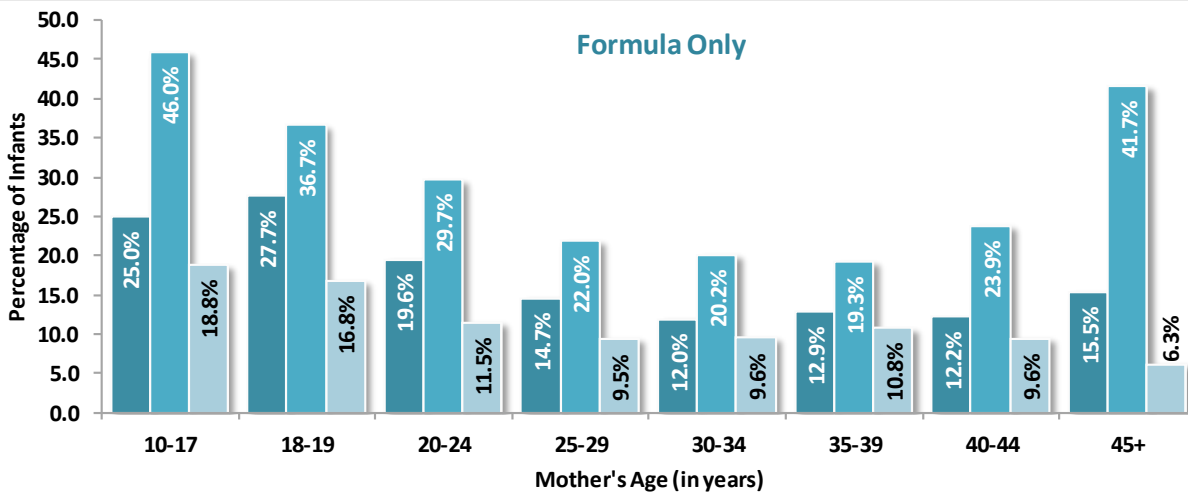
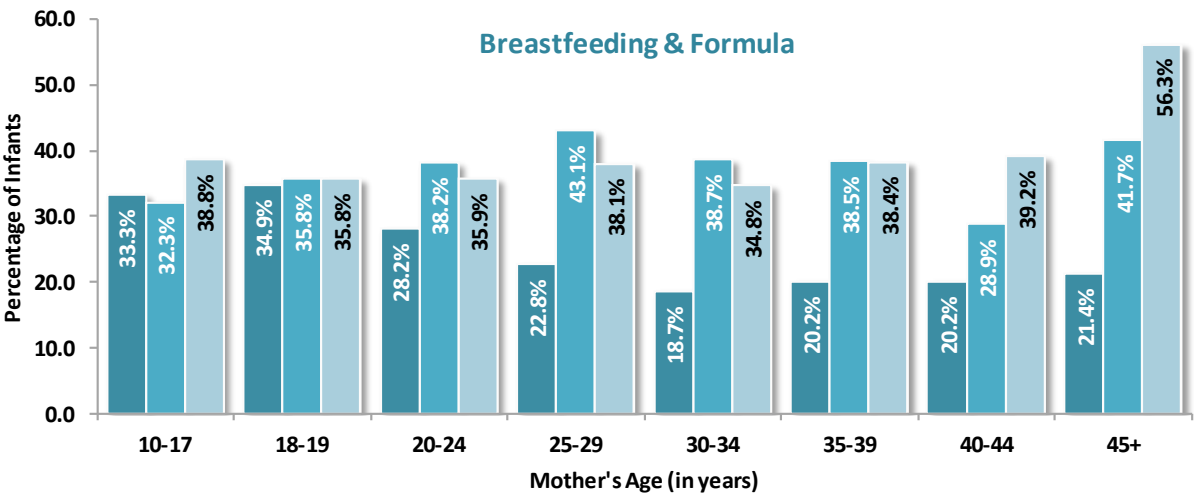
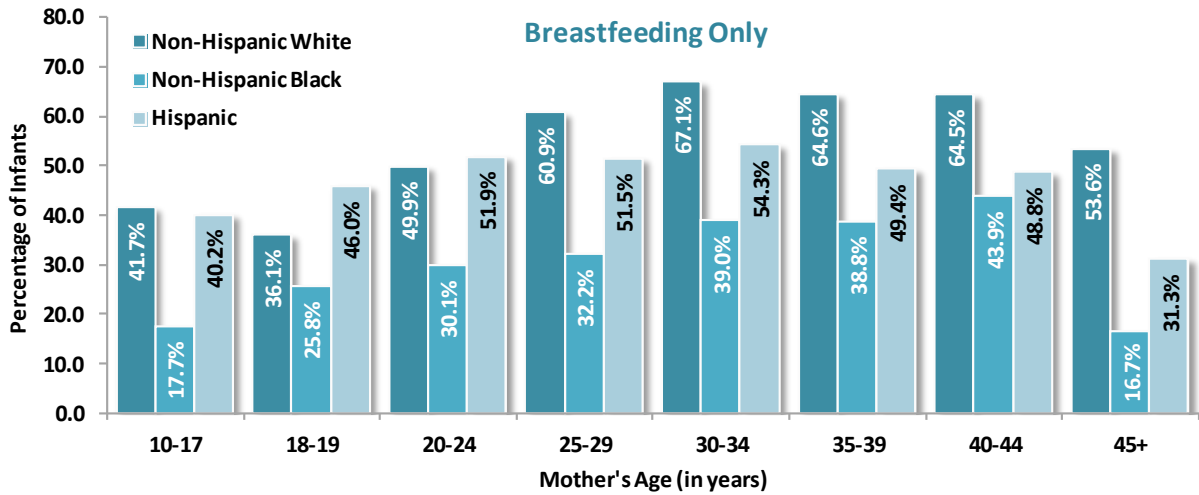

Percentage of Infants by Feeding Method in Hospital and Race & Ethnicity*, 2008-2010

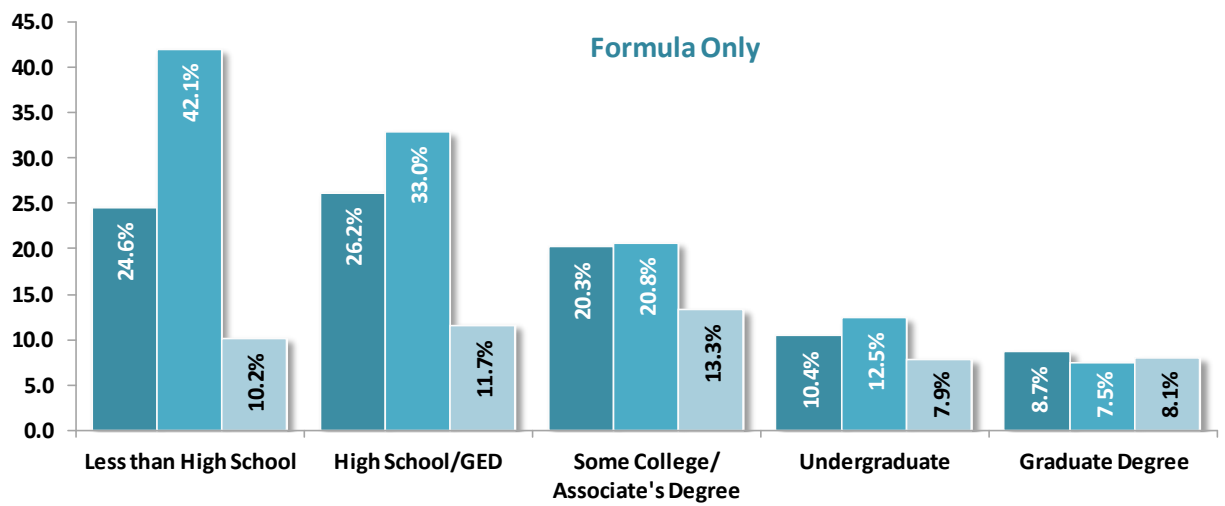
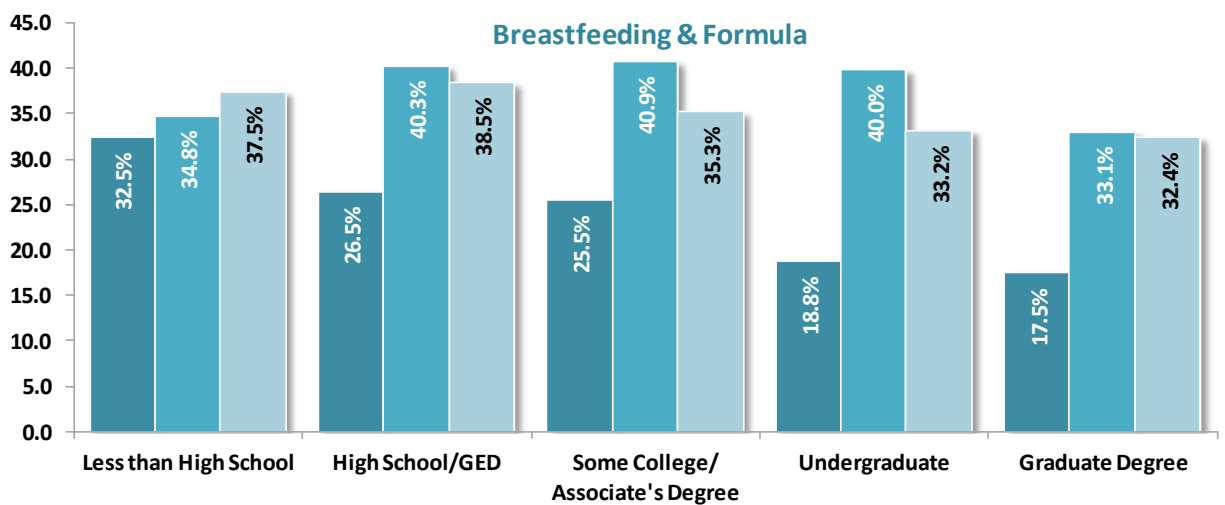
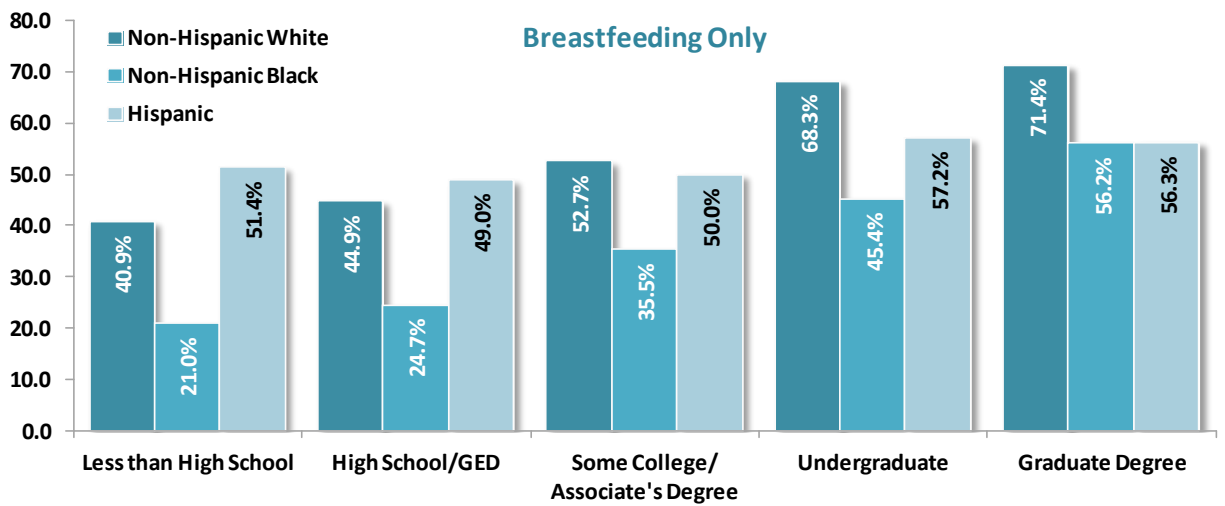

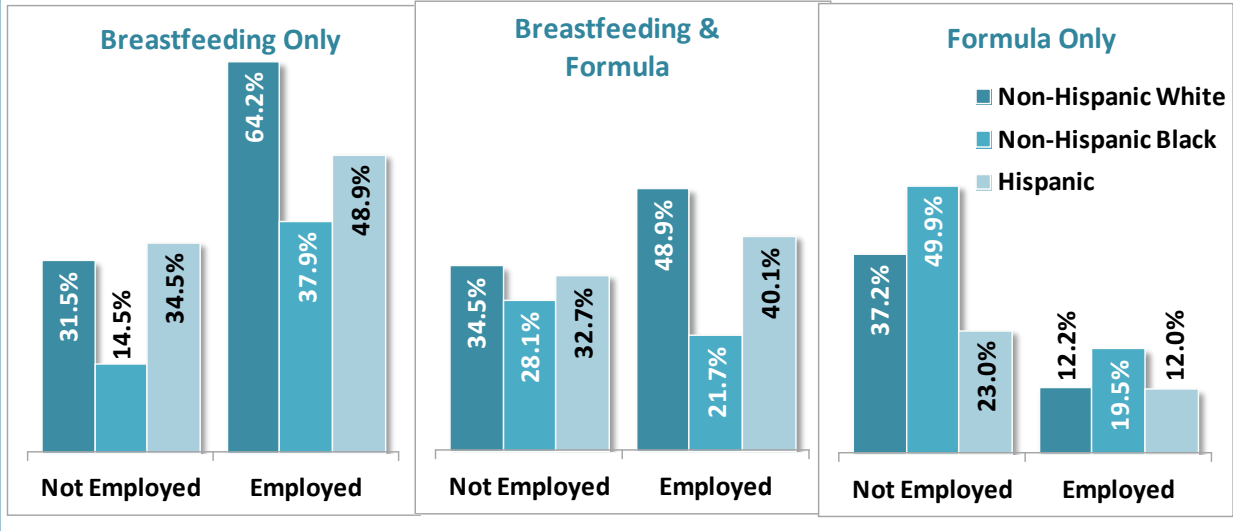
Percentage of Infants by Feeding Method in Hospital and Mother's Age and Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010



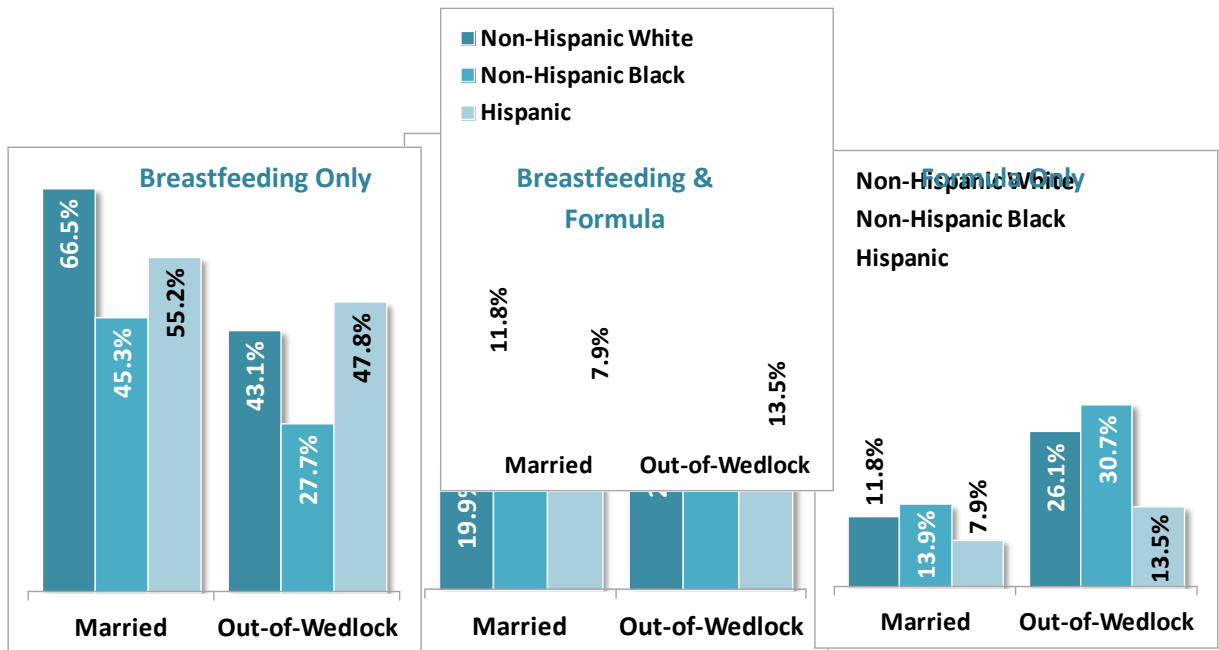
Percentage of Infants by Feeding Method in Hospital and Mother's Education Level and Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010



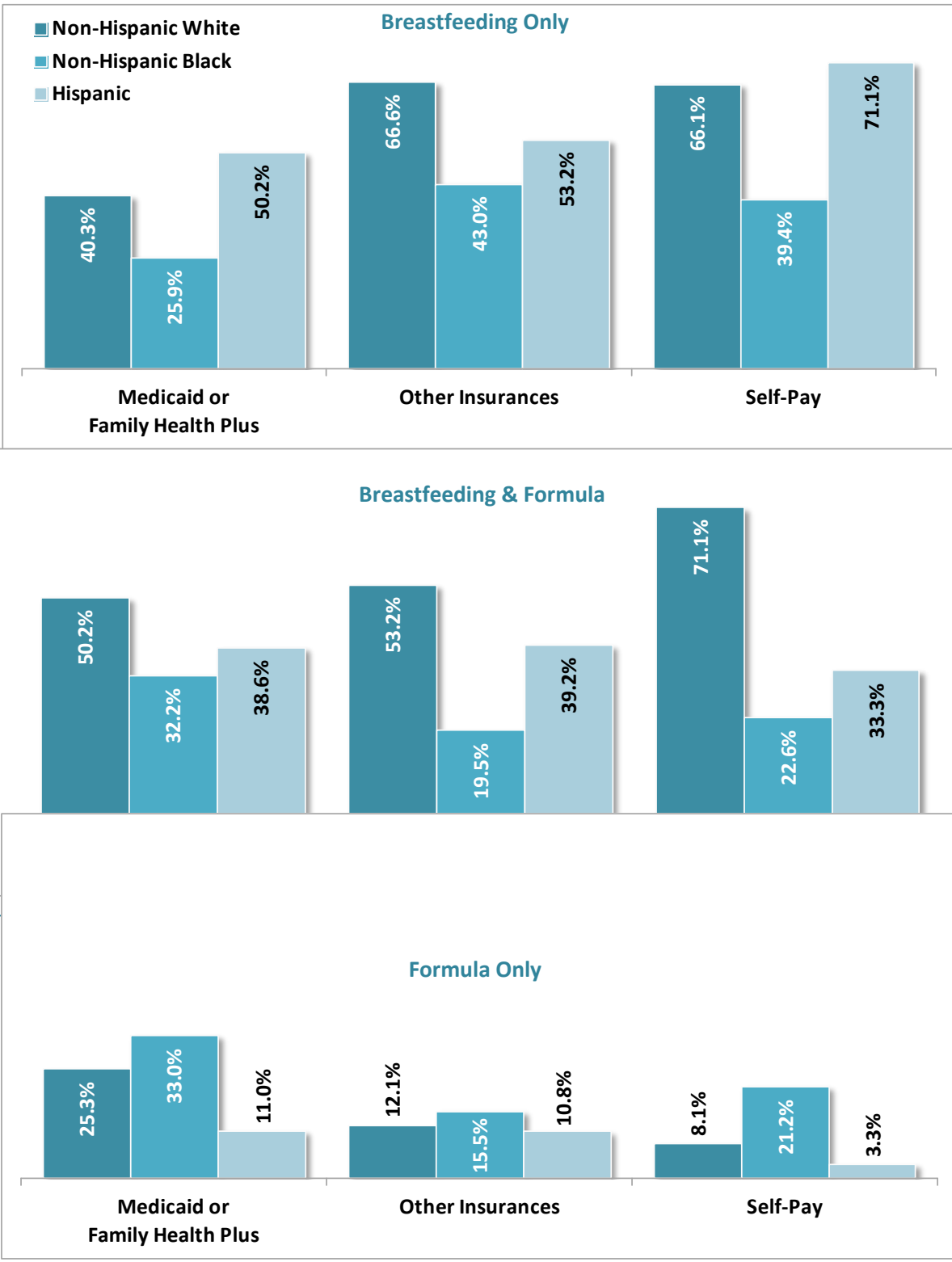
Percentage of Infants by Feeding Method in Hospital and Mother's Employment Status and Race & Ethnicity, 2008-2010

Facilitated Breakout Session 1: Identifying Barriers, Actions Needed, and Best Practices

Prevent Chronic Disease: Decreasing the Percentage of Blacks and Hispanics Dying Prematurely from Heart Related Diseases

Barriers and Gaps

- I. Lack of access to care.

Actions Needed

1. Address individuals' basic needs and look at the context in which they live. Economics, employment and basic needs have to be addressed before health can be a priority.
2. Make health the priority.
3. Make healthy choice the easy choice.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

1. Primary Care initiatives – getting physicians together to discuss frontline education and drilling down on what the community members are saying, what they need, and how we can reach them in a thoughtful and productive manner.
2. Start small initiatives which present manageable projects to work on, track, and monitor progress.
3. Due to the diversity of Westchester, agencies and hospitals need to develop plans based on specific community characteristics.

Barriers and Gaps

- II. Health literacy, language and cultural barriers, and a fear of engaging with a complex health system.

Actions Needed

1. Help the community understand and take advantage of the health care system.
2. Need to go beyond the community and teach health providers how to fully explain care. Word to remember: EMPATHY.
3. Agencies and hospitals need to partner together to tackle the inpatient and outpatient communities.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

1. WIC clinics and nutrition: they don't just hand out pamphlets to clients. Instead, they provide hands-on instructions, explanations, and demonstrations. Step back and teach.
2. In Hispanic communities, for example, there is a notion that whole milk is the healthiest option and the fear of changing ingredients will change the taste of their foods and their families won't eat them. With hands-on demonstrations and explanations, this belief can be changed.
3. WCDH's website: It is my Health Care.
4. NYS Quit Line: good reports from the Quit Line shows benefits from phone lines and interactive programs.
5. Share resource lists to identify and track available services, as well as identify further needs and forge collaborations.

Barriers and Gaps

- III. Lack of baseline data.

Actions Needed

1. Collect baseline data and continue tracking efforts to measure success.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

1. Provider report cards.
2. Documenting screenings/outcomes (general) at health fairs and events would provide a baseline which one can measure overtime.
3. You can create your own baseline and identify areas for improvement.
4. American Heart Association provides great baselines and program guidelines for measuring outcomes.
5. Focus on small and measurable areas such as documenting every blood pressure program, nutrition workshop, and stroke lecture series to provide baseline information.

Barriers and Gaps

- IV. No sense of urgency in preventing chronic health problems.

Actions Needed

1. Prevent chronic health problems before they begin.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

1. Engage kids with technology; start early.
2. Prevention: Healthy from birth to life.
3. Reducing obesity.
4. Youth Development Model.
5. Kiosks in low income and senior housing to engage communities in social marketing and interactive health programs, nutrition tips, etc.
6. Garden-to-Table programs – teaching about fresh foods, cooking for wellness, etc.

Facilitated Breakout Session 2: Identifying Barriers, Actions Needed, and Best Practices

Promote Healthy Women, Infants and Children: Increasing the Proportion of Infants that are Breastfed

Barriers and Gaps

- I. Cultural issues and lack of support from family members.
- II. Some women do not believe they will produce enough milk.
- III. Big formula marketing in social media.

Actions Needed

1. Women need to be empowered to choose breastfeeding when it is not the norm.
2. The whole family needs to support breastfeeding. Involving family members to participate in other ways, such as when mom pumps, dad gives the bottle.
3. Classes at hospital for all family members with newborns to provide information on breastfeeding and changes after having babies.
4. A clear and consistent message across the board: during prenatal care, in hospitals, breastfeeding classes, etc. All health care providers need to be able to discuss breastfeeding with women.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

1. Start education on breastfeeding at an early age with children in school based health centers.
2. Start promoting breastfeeding during prenatal care.
3. Health care providers in NICU are good resources to advocate for breastfeeding for babies' immunity and make referrals for lactation consultation.
4. Planned Parenthood is staffed with prenatal counselors and nutritionists, and provides education for prenatal women on breastfeeding.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

5. Hudson Health Plan's maternal and child health program, "Mommy and Me", is staffed with two RNs. This integrated program not only helps coordinating care but also looking at psychosocial issues and behavioral issues. Nurses also work with moms with babies in NICU, another educational opportunity.
6. A NYS course provides information on breastfeeding to health care providers.
7. Phelps Memorial Hospital has established a Milk Banking system to collect milk from mother volunteers and provide it to infants in need of breast milk. The volunteer mothers and their milk are tested, 60-70% of benefits are kept in the Milk Bank after pasteurizing. This is a good option for supplementing.

Promote Healthy Women, Infants and Children: Increasing the Proportion of Infants that are Breastfed

Barriers and Gaps

- IV. Difficult to continue breastfeeding after leaving hospital.
- V. Lack of support from employers and communities.
- VI. Workplace support is the number one issue for working moms to continue to breastfeed after going back to work (i.e. pumping in bathroom stalls).

Actions Needed

1. Community based organizations need to create and provide community connections.
2. Need to involve businesses in the discussion of breastfeeding. Women need clean, comfortable places to breastfeed or pump at work. Employers and communities need to look into how breastfeeding friendly they are (i.e. do they have designated areas to breastfeed?).

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

1. The WIC program in Sound Shore Medical Center was awarded a grant from NYSDOH to promote breastfeeding. With three peer counselors and lactation consultants on staff, the program is designed to increase the exclusive breastfeeding rate and the length of time moms breastfeed.
2. Lawrence Hospital has created an online program: Breastfeeding and Beyond Group, which is a closed group on Facebook. The group is facilitated by the hospital but “owned” by the members of the group. Members provide support to each other by meetings and other methods.
3. Hudson Health Plan’s “Mommy and Me” program sees many moms who need assistance beyond the postpartum period and stay with the program until no longer needed.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

4. Phelps Memorial Hospital is currently rewriting policies, looking into prenatal educational materials, and providing more information to OB/GYNs and clinics to reach the prenatal population. They offer breastfeeding classes, breastfeeding for multiples, and refreshers for moms, especially if they have had previous difficult breastfeeding experiences. In addition, discharge education on breastfeeding is provided by a lactation consultant who can also call and/or visits the moms after discharge.
5. Hudson Health Plan has a designated room for breastfeeding employees, a quiet place with a refrigerator.

Promote Healthy Women, Infants and Children: Increasing the Proportion of Infants that are Breastfed

Barriers and Gaps

- VII. Hospitals provide formula and keep babies in the nursery.
- VIII. Health care providers giving medications to breastfeeding moms without considering their side effects on breast milk and advising moms to discontinue breastfeeding.

Actions Needed

- 1. Not all hospitals have breastfeeding support programs.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

- 1. Hudson Valley Hospital is designated as a Baby Friendly Hospital, certified by Baby Friendly USA, with policies and procedures focused on breastfeeding.
- 2. Lawrence Hospital is staffed with lactation consultants who work on staff education of knowledge and comfort when discussing breastfeeding. The hospital also holds a support group for any breastfeeding moms in the community twice a month.
- 3. Open Door has the number one breastfeeding rate in NYS.

Promote Healthy Women, Infants and Children: Increasing the Proportion of Infants that are Breastfed

Barriers and Gaps

- IX. WIC moms are concerned about cut-backs in benefits and services if they breastfeed.
- X. Lack of supply of electric breast pumps and difficulties in getting them paid for by managed care.

Actions Needed

- 1. Need to train WIC staff to discuss about breastfeeding and take the time required for training and reinforcement.

Best Practice Examples, Possible Resources, & Next Steps

- 1. WCDH's WIC program is staffed with certified lactation consultants and peer counselor programs. WIC staff work with other WIC moms and hold monthly breastfeeding classes. Both breastfeeding and prenatal moms are encouraged to attend and staff help facilitate the conversations about breastfeeding, as well as issue breast pumps to help moms go back to school or work and continue breastfeeding.

In the process of implementing the Community Health Improvement Plan and monitoring its process, WCDH plans to both partner with the health summit members, the Health Planning Team (hospitals) and academia and establish two committees: the Health Disparities/Chronic Disease Priority Implementation Committee, and the Breastfeeding Priority Implementation Committee. These two committees will be responsible for the execution of the plan. The activities of the committees may include, but not limited to, identifying and recruiting critical stakeholders, reviewing existing and new evidenced based models, supporting hospitals and other community partners in working towards achieving the goals, developing local measures to monitor plan activities, creating data collection tools, and compiling countywide consolidated plans that delineate all the strategies to be undertaken in Westchester County in support of the priority areas. We plan to convene regular meetings, collaborate on initiatives, review progress and recruit additional partners to participate as needed.

Potential activities and possible measures of progress are included in this section. However, these activities and measures may be modified based on feedback from the Implementation Committees.

Priority Area 1. Prevent Chronic Disease

Goal: Reduce Racial Disparities by Decreasing the Percentage of Blacks and Hispanics Dying Prematurely from Heart Related Diseases.

Objective: By December 31, 2017, decrease the percentage of Blacks and Hispanics dying of heart related diseases before 65 years of age by 5%.

Performance Measures and Data Source:

Baseline: Currently, among Blacks who died of heart related diseases, 22.4% were premature deaths. Among Hispanics who died of heart related diseases, 28.8% were premature.

Objective: Reduce the percentage of premature deaths from heart related disease to less than 21.3% among Blacks and 27.4% among Hispanics

Data Source: NYS Vital Records

Additional Potential Measures and Data Sources:

- Obesity among public school aged children (elementary and middle school), NYS Student Weight Status Category Reporting System
- Obesity among adults, Behavioral Risk Factor Surveillance System
- The percent of patients 18 years and older with high blood pressure in WCDH clinics by race and ethnicity, WCDH internal clinic data.
- The percent of patients 16 years and older using tobacco in WCDH clinics and the percent of current smokers who received cessation counseling and referral, WCDH internal clinic data.

Westchester County Regional Profiles

As part of the Community Health Assessment (CHA), the regional profile provides detailed information on geographic, demographic, socioeconomic, and health related indicators for the County and each of the six cities and 19 towns within the County.

Each profile contains six pages, presenting the following information:

1. Area and population in the region, open spaces, parks, housing units in the region, municipalities and zip codes included in the region, number of businesses by size, health related resources, and other assets.
2. Population composition, including age, sex, race/ethnicity, country of origin, language spoken at home, education, family structure, income, employment, and commuting methods.
3. Births in the County, including number of births, births by mother's age, race/ethnicity, country of origin, marital status, education, prenatal care, delivery methods, health insurance coverage at delivery, the infants' birth order, birthweight, and how the infants were fed at the hospital.
4. Deaths in the County, including number of deaths, infant mortality, average age at death, sex, race/ethnicity of the deceased, major causes of death, number of premature deaths by race/ethnicity.
5. Emergency Room visits and Hospitalizations, by sex, age, race/ethnicity, top causes, major receiving hospitals, and insurance coverage.
6. Select cancer incidence rates, reported communicable diseases, and public school students overweight and obesity rates.
7. Map of locations of available resources.

Open Space: From Westchester County Department of Planning.

Housing Units (2010): From the 2010 Population Census.

Major Employers (2011): From the 2011 County Business Patterns Program of the U.S. Census Bureau, which offers annual statistics on the number of establishments, employment, and payroll classified by industry within each county.

Health Care Resources and Other Assets: If not otherwise noted, data are from the 2007 Economic Census conducted by the U.S. Census, which offers data on business establishment activities based on the North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) codes.

Offices of Physicians: Excluding mental health specialists.

Offices of Mental Health Physicians and Practitioners: Including mental health physicians and practitioners.

Offices of Dentists: Including general dentists and dental specialists.

Office of Other Health Practitioners: Including chiropractors, optometrists, physical, occupational & speech therapists, audiologists, podiatrists, and all other miscellaneous health practitioners.

Major Acute Care and Specialty Hospitals: Including general medical & surgical hospitals, psychiatric & substance abuse hospitals, and other specialty hospitals. Data from New York State Department of Health.

Outpatient Health Care Centers: Including family planning centers, outpatient mental health & substance abuse centers, HMO medical centers, kidney dialysis centers, and all other outpatient care centers.

Ambulatory Health Care Services: Including ambulance services, blood & organ banks, freestanding ambulatory surgical & emergency centers, and all other miscellaneous ambulatory health care services.

Medical Laboratories and Diagnostic Imaging Centers: Including medical laboratories and diagnostic imaging centers.

Nursing and Other Residential Care Facilities: Including nursing homes, adult care facilities, and hospice. Data from New York State Department of Health.

Visiting Home Health Care Services: Including federally certified home care agencies, licensed home health care agencies, and long-term home health care agencies. Data from New York State Department of Health.

Health and Personal Care Stores: Including pharmacies & drug stores, optical goods stores, food (health) supplement stores, and all other health and personal care stores.

Individual and Family Services: Including child & youth services, services for the elderly & persons with disabilities, and other individual and family services.

Emergency and Various Relief Services: Including community food services, temporary shelters, other community housing services, and emergency & other relief services.

Child Day Care Services: Including regulated child care establishments. Data from New York State Department of Health.

Specialty Food Stores: Including meat markets, fish & seafood markets, fruits & vegetable markets, baked goods stores, confectionery & nut stores, and all other specialty food stores.

Demographics: From the 2010 Population Census and the 2007-2011 American Community Survey (ACS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau. The ACS was used to replace the long form in the decennial census in 2010.

Commuters Using Alternative Mode of Transportation: Including carpooling, public transportation, bicycling, walking, or telecommuting.

Births & Deaths (2008-2010): Annual average of certificate records of live births and deaths of Westchester County residents. From New York State Department of Health Vital Statistics.

Birth Rate (per 1,000): Number of live births per 1,000 population.

Late or No Prenatal Care: Time starting prenatal care is measured by the number of months of the pregnancy at the time when prenatal care was initiated. Late prenatal care is defined as those starting prenatal care during the third trimester. The percentage calculation excludes those with no information.

Birthweight: Low birthweight is defined as a birthweight less than 2,500 grams.

Death Rate (per 100,000): Number of deaths per 100,000 population.

Infant Mortality Rate: Number of deaths under one year of age per 1,000 live births occurring during the year.

Premature Deaths: Death under age of 65.

Emergency Room Visits (2008-2010): Annual average number of cases received treatment from a hospital emergency room or ambulatory surgery services per 100,000 population. From New York Statewide Planning and Research Cooperative System (SPARCS).

Hospitalization (2008-2010): Annual average number of cases admitted to an acute-care hospital per 100,000 population. From New York Statewide Planning and Research Cooperative System (SPARCS).

Top Causes of ER Visits and Top Causes of Hospitalization: Defined by principal diagnosis. Excluding newborns.

Cancer Incidence (2005-2009): Annual average number of new cases per 100,000 population. Age-adjusted to the 2000 U.S. Census standard population. From New York State Department of Health Cancer Registry.

Public School Student obesity Status: School years 2008-2010. Data from New York State Public School Student Weight Status Category Reporting System (SWSCR).

Overweight: Body Mass Index (BMI) at or above the 85th percentile and less than the 95th percentile.

Obese: Body Mass Index (BMI) at or above the 95th percentile.

Hospitals

There are a total of **18** hospitals operating in Westchester County (NYS DOH as of 11/04/2013):

16 hospitals with an NYS PFI number, and **2** additional hospitals: Four Winds Hospital, a private specialty hospital for psychiatric and substance abuse; and the Veterans Administration (VA) hospital, a federal specialty hospital.

Residential Care includes the following:

Nursing Homes. There are **42** nursing homes which provide skilled nursing care based in residential facilities in Westchester County (NYS DOH as of 10/24/2013). Two of these facilities are pediatric: Elizabeth Seton Pediatric Center and Sunshine Children's Home and Rehab Center.

Adult Care Facilities. There are **31** adult care facilities operating in Westchester County (NYS DOH as of Feb 2013), providing temporary or long-term, non-medical residential care services to adults who are substantially unable to live independently.

Hospice. There are **4** hospice care agencies operating in Westchester County (NYS DOH as of 09/21/2012).

Visiting Home Health Care Service includes the following:

Certified Home Health Care Agency. There are **8** CHHCA's operating in WC (NYS DOH website as of 11/01/2013). CHHCA's can take Medicare and Medicaid for direct reimbursement, as well as private payment and some health insurers.

Licensed Home Health Care Agency. There are **62** LHHCA's operating in WC (NYS DOH website as of 09/21/2013). LHHCA's can take private payment and some health insurers, and may also contract to provide services to Medicare/Medicaid beneficiaries whose cases are managed by another provider or entity, such as providing home health aide services to a certified home health agency patient or providing a licensed practical nurse for a Medicaid prior-approved private duty nursing shift.

Long-term Home Health Care Agency. There are **6** LTHHC's in WC (NYS DOH website as of 09/21/2012). An LTHHC program is a coordinated plan of medical, nursing, and rehabilitative care provided at home to persons with disabilities who are medically eligible for placement in a nursing home. This program offers patients an alternative to institutionalization.

Federally Qualified Neighborhood Health Centers

There were **16** separate sites for FQNHHC's in Westchester County.

Public Libraries

Data from Westchester Library System. There are **37** public libraries currently operating in Westchester County.

Public and Private Schools, and Colleges and Universities

There were **248** public schools, **102** private schools, and **23** colleges and universities in Westchester County, according to the Westchester County government website, updated as of 08/16/2012 (public and private schools) and 03/13/2013 (colleges and universities).

Mental Health Programs

There were **254** separate mental health programs in Westchester County (NYS DOH website, updated 8/22/2013). Multiple programs could be in the same location (e.g., one organization could have six different mental health programs operating out of the same office site, such as housing, substance abuse, peer counseling, family support, advocacy, outreach, etc). These programs include those that were licensed by the Office of Mental Health (OMH) and as well as those that were funded by OMH but do not need a license to operate.

Child Care Programs (Regulated)

There were **749** regulated child care programs operating in Westchester County (NYS DOH website, updated 10/26/2013) with a valid license and registration.

Advantage Afterschool Programs

There are **12** Advantage Afterschool Programs operating in Westchester County (NYS DOH website, updated 05/07/13). These agencies are currently contracting with New York State to provide Advantage After School Program services in Westchester County.

Major Highways, Parks and Trailways

Information on highways, parks and trailways was supplied by the WC GIS department.
